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7	RONE: Joining us first on the show <sup>1</sup> today
8	first time he's ever come on Steak for Breakfast
9	with us we're very pleased to have him. He's a
10	former Trump White House staffer. He also is the
11	founder of Marco Polo, a nonprofit research group
12	exposing corruption and blackmail to drive American
13	renaissance.
14	Sounds pretty spicy. I think we're going to
15	like it.
16	Mr. Garrett Ziegler, thanks for coming on
17	Steak for Breakfast.
18	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Thank you very much. Good
19	morning. Appreciate [you] having me on.
20	RONE: Oh, the pleasure's all ours, sir.
21	How's everything going with you?
22	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Going good. I you know,
23	we just got an agreement done with <i>The U.S. Sun,</i>
24	which is an outlet that is British based but they
25	have they have an American version to the

outlet. And we're going to be putting out, over the next 30 days, a myriad of stories about the First Family.

You know, the spicy ones<sup>2</sup> have already come out with Hunter smoking crack in the shower and getting a hand job from two women; but there's going to be stuff that ranges -- that pretty much runs the gamut. It's a sociological disaster -- that family.

The pResident is the -- basically the patriarch of drunks and drug addicts. And that's what he's raised. And, you know, Ashley and Hunter, two of his children, have different mothers but they're both disasters. They're both just wrecks -- and that goes to show that Joe can't even manage his own household, let alone the country.

So that's what we're doing. We're nonprofit but we're -- we're partnering with different outlets that have committed to writing the truth about the Biden family. And then we've been working on this -- what I'll call dossier/Report.

It's over 600 pages -- it's on the Biden Laptop -- and that's basically been my focus for the last ten months.

The -- the election was obviously -- it was obviously stolen and I've committed myself to

3	on.  NOAH: Yeah.
4	NOAH: Yeah.
5	RONE: I was posting I was posting some
6	stuff about the most recent Biden information or
7	Hunter Biden information that's been posted
8	online
9	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yeah.
10	RONE: and somebody's like, "Why does this
11	stuff always change?" And I'm like, "Well, because
12	this is new, this isn't the laptop."
13	NOAH: Yeah.
14	RONE: "This is"
15	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yes.
16	RONE: "is his iCloud. This is brand new."
17	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Well, not his iCloud. This
18	is his
19	RONE: Or
20	GARRETT ZIEGLER: this is his iPhone
21	backup.
22	RONE: His backup.
23	GARRETT ZIEGLER: That's
24	RONE: Yeah. Basically
25	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yes.

1	And I've been I think the the effort to
2	put the "iCloud" word in the the narrative of
3	public reporting is to suggest that that
4	somebody, maybe not us, Marco Polo, but somebody
5	hacked him. And I want to avoid that at all costs.
6	I want to avoid that like the plague
7	RONE: Oh.
8	GARRETT ZIEGLER: because the Secret
9	Service has already put out a statement, you know,
10	"We're aware of reports of Hunter Biden's iCloud
11	being hacked." <sup>3</sup>
12	And so when we got into this backup that a
13	couple of other groups apparently had gotten into,
14	one of which was an anonymous user on 4chan.
15	RONE: Yeah.
16	GARRETT ZIEGLER: And I praise their their
17	technical prowess. I want everybody to see this
18	stuff.
19	RONE: Yeah.
20	GARRETT ZIEGLER: But the iPhone backup I was
21	shaking when we got into it.
22	And I didn't know this guys, but and and
23	I don't I don't have a ton of background on how
24	technically proficient you are; I am not at all.
25	But apparently what we did and what these other

1	groups did, there was a bounty that Apple put out
2	for like millions of dollars for what we did. We
3	basically got into an encrypted backup on his
4	laptop.
5	So I don't know if we can collect money on
6	So I don't know if we can collect money on that. I'm sure Apple's not going to pay us for
7	getting into the pResident's son's
8	RONE: It's a trap.
9	GARRETT ZIEGLER: iPhone backup.
10	But what what we did, I we were shaking
11	when we got into it. 28 gigabytes, dozens of more
12	videos, dozens of more drug deals. I mean, this is
13	the worst shit that he wanted to for that
14	that he wanted nobody to see, basically.
15	RONE: Uh-huh. Yeah, it's pretty interesting.
16	You you know, and you you've mentioned it
17	Garrett, some of some of the real absolute chads
18	on 4chan that have been working hard.
19	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yes.
20	RONE: You know, fighting on the digital
21	battlefield here.
22	NOAH: 4chad?
23	GARRETT ZIEGLER: (Laughter.)
24	RONE: But but this thing is just come
25	leaking into the news right now, like in the last

1	maybe week or so; however, you were way ahead of
2	this story, what, almost a month ago?
3	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Well, I started writing the
4	report on September 1st [2021], I think, is when I started
5	with the legal pad getting out it took me about,
6	quite honestly, guys, it took me about a month and
7	a half to figure out the outline. Because there's
8	so many crimes, you want it you know, some
9	people wanted me to do it chronologically just
10	start at 2013, which is basically when the e-mails
11	start.
12	RONE: Uh-huh.
13	NOAH: Right.
14	GARRETT ZIEGLER: And we put all of his
15	e-mails on BidenLaptopEmails.com over 128,000 of
16	them, my nonprofit did.
17	And we started writing this last September. I
18	knew that it was one of the top stories of the
19	century just because
20	RONE: Um, yeah.
21	GARRETT ZIEGLER: of the Pavlovian dog-like
22	response by the mainstream press in covering this
23	up and suspending the New York Post [Twitter] account,
24	suspending the White House Press Secretary [Twitter] account.
25	But I think that now Biden is so he's so

1	osteoporotically limping through the world stage
2	that maybe they smell blood; and the vultures, like
3	Kamala [Harris] and [Gavin] Newsom, even though they're
4	they're saying that publicly they support him, they're
5	sniffing the fact that he couldn't run again. And
6	so now, although we've been on this for ten months,
7	some of the left and some of the mainstream media
8	has looked at it as though in their own interest to
9	start talking about how pathetic this guy is.
10	So, I don't know if they're on our side, Rone
11	and Noah, but I can guarantee that, you know, more
12	shit's going to come out because nobody's he's
13	still protected, of course, but the degree with
14	which they'll circle him, like like oxen when a
15	wolf arrives is decreasing.

RONE: Yeah, it's interesting to see because, you know, you're the worst of the worst person ever in the world if you criticize him, and then all of a sudden: Hey, you know, what? We're going to have to start criticizing this guy.

GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yeah. And one -- one thing
I want to mention because I know you guys have a
huge audience and I don't think I've been on a show
with this many people. I was listening to -- to
what Rone posted and he said it's in the Top 20 [news podcasts].

Ţ	But one one thing I want to drive nome is
2	that Hunter knew, as of 2018, that his dad had
3	dementia. <sup>5</sup> And, ironically, he was discussing this
4	fact with his psychiatrist, Keith Ablow, who's sort
5	of a disgraced <sup>6</sup> GO GOP establishment celebrity
6	psychiatrist up in Newburyport, Massachusetts. And
7	Keith Ablow ironically postulated <sup>7</sup> that, in 2013
8	even, in the vice-presidential debate, I think this
9	was November 2012, that that Joe had dementia in
10	his debate with Paul Ryan.
11	So I don't know why Hunter picked Keith Ablow,
12	considering he's a Republican, but I guess he's
13	sort of establishment – he [Ablow] likes Joe.
14	But, you know, the family has known this for
15	over four years now. And we see it every day. I
16	mean, this is just a cookie-cutter case and he
17	can't hold multiple complex ideas at the same time,
18	he can't say, you know, words like kleptocracy.8
19	Remember that one when he was
20	RONE: Oh, yeah.
21	GARRETT ZIEGLER: talking about the the
22	kleptocrats in Russia? He can't even say the word.
23	And I grew up stuttering, so he always falls
24	back on the fact <sup>9</sup> that, "Oh, it's my stutter.
25	You're making fun of me. I'm stuttering don't

2	But he he struggles with three-syllable
3	words.
4	RONE: Yeah, it it's really sad to see the
5	large decline of him
6	NOAH: Well, maybe he picked that psychiatrist
7	because it was a Groupon or something.
8	RONE: Stop it.
9	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Keith is a mess. Keith lost
10	his license to practice medicine in Massachusetts.
11	Some of his patients had [been asked by] Keith
12	[to get his initials tattooed near] their genitals. <sup>10</sup>
13	RONE: What?
14	GARRETT ZIEGLER: He he's a sociopath,
15	okay?
16	And he's a he's a GOP hack that has been in
17	the public eye for years and I and the reason I
18	think why Hunter went to him is because he has a
19	history of working with celebrities. And he hasn't
20	really told anybody a lot about his his
21	treatment of Hunter. I think that's why Hunter
22	went to him. He's actually discreet even though
23	Hunter's attorney's trying to throw him under the
24	bus and blame him for his laptop debacle because
25	Hunter left <sup>11</sup> another one of his laptops at Keith

1	Ablow's place. And so they're just basically using
2	him as as a Girardian scapegoat <sup>12</sup> for this entire
3	saga.
4	That's why I texted Keith, I said and I
5	texted Keith's assistant, Tiffany [Bartholomew]
6	I said, "you're you're thrown you're going
7	to be thrown <sup>13</sup> under the bus, just FYI."
8	And so they kind of have an affinity for me,
9	even though I think they're terrible people,
10	because I at least tell the truth to them.
11	NOAH: Yeah, I mean, if his if his
12	psychiatrist is so much of a manipulator that he's
13	gotten people to tattoo their names his name on
14	their
15	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yes.
16	NOAH: privates, then I would venture
17	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yeah.
18	NOAH: to say that Hunter probably met him
19	at a party. That's probably how it happened.
20	GARRETT ZIEGLER: There's a great piece that
21	your read that your listeners will love, in the
22	Boston Globe, February of 2019. This is while
23	Hunter was still in Newburyport. The title of the
24	piece is, "I Own You."14 And it's basically the
25	expose of Keith Ablow. And then one year later,

1	almost to the day, his office got raided by the
2	DEA. <sup>15</sup>
3	He was he was not charged in that case, but
4	basically he was giving out scripts that weren't
5	kosher. And
6	kosher. And  RONE: Sounds weird.
7	GARRETT ZIEGLER: he's just a weird guy,
8	totally.
9	But I I appreciate you guys going into this
10	because nobody nobody really want this is a
11	fascinating sociological, basically, saga because,
12	you know, this guy, Keith Ablow, is so is so
13	central to this scandal, but nobody usually lets me
14	go into him because it's in the weeds. But I'm
15	telling you, if if there are any honest writers
16	left, right-wing, left-wing, whatever, there the
17	stories are there.
18	And we're writing that in our Report, but our
19	Report's pretty dry. I mean, we basically say in
20	very very dry language: "Hunter then proceeded
21	to shave his gooch, or perineum," in the technical <sup>16</sup>
22	language, "with a female BiC purple razor, and What
23	[Makes] a Good Man <sup>17</sup> is playing in the background."
24	Like we write it like a like a crime scene;
25	whereas if somebody were, like, a journalist, they

2	maybe one of your listeners will take me up on my
3	offer.
4	RONE: Yeah. Every new thing you tell me
5	about the psychiatrist makes more sense why Hunter
6	goes to him. The the bad scripts, like could we
7	get the record of how many scripts he wrote for
8	Hunter?
9	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Oh, Viagra off the charts.
10	RONE: Yeah.
11	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Hunter was Hunter
12	Hunter actually got this is one of our crimes.
13	Mere mortals get busted for this.
14	Hunter not only, obviously, procured crack
15	cocaine, but he actually procured black market
16	Viagra from this drug dealer that he called "Frankie"
17	who we cannot identify. We've had two different
18	private investigators run his run the number and
19	we can't get a solid look on who it is behind it.
20	We've obviously tried to catfish him, multiple
21	people multiple associates of mine have tried to
22	reach out to him to try and get more info.
23	But Hunter was dealing in black market Viagra
24	all this stuff. Shrooms. He's a mess.
25	RONE: Wow.

GARRETT ZIEGLER: And the ironic thing is
by the way, I grew up liking, you know, Ron Paul.
I have different views on what we should do about
the drug problem.

The reason why I bring this up is because Joe is the very man who put tens of thousands of Black men behind bars for five years --

> RONE: Yeah.

-- with no parole. 18 And so GARRETT ZIEGLER: it's not that I'm saying that oh, we should do nothing about drugs -- I think it's terrible and I think the dealers should be, you know, and -- and the users -- should be held accountable, but it's just ironic that Hunter, even though he's this rich White guy, son of a Senator, you'd think he'd be into blow where he's, like, you know, snorting lines off with hundred-dollar bills; but he's actually smoking crack, which is the exact thing his dad, you know, put people behind bars for, for forever. It's just so, so ironic.

NOAH: Yeah, it certainly is and it's one of those things where, you know, the more we kind of deconstruct and -- and add pieces to the puzzle that is the Hunter Biden narrative, you find out how much of a sociopath he is. And, you know, it's

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1	like he he he's his perception of reality
2	is so warped it's almost like he's inner
3	monologuingly [sic] narrating his own life like it is a
4	movie.
5	All the stuff he does and the weird way he is
6	with his phone all the time, like, you know,
7	it's it's I I can understand at the end of
8	a bender if you want to, like, document some of
9	like, you know, your best slays, that's fine. But
10	there's like thousands of hours of him just doing
11	drugs and being, like, the you know, literally
12	one of the most awful people on the face of the
13	earth. And with some of the people he's done it
14	with, all the way up from his brother's wife to,
15	you know, how he requested his taste in hookers.
16	It just seems like
17	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yeah.
18	NOAH: it's just a really awful person.
19	GARRETT ZIEGLER: "No yellow." <sup>19</sup> That's a
20	great
21	NOAH: "No yellow."
22	GARRETT ZIEGLER: that's a great point you
23	had, you know.
24	And the one of the things that has, I
25	wouldn't say comforted me, but it basically

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solidified my opinion of Hunter, is his attorney has now started to go after my group, my nonprofit, which is me and five other guys who have remained anonymous as of late because they don't want to get doxxed, et cetera, and I -- I understand that.

But basically, his attorney, his name's Kevin Morris, has called me a, quote, "vicious little pussy"<sup>20</sup> and knows where I live and it's all terrible.

And what this tells me is that Hunter hasn't changed at all. One of the great pieces<sup>21</sup> that had come out of this was at the *Washington Examiner*. They did this -- the video that you've all seen by now where Hunter's constructing a video alibi with a Russian prostitute, he said, "is anything bruised on you? Are you okay? Did I hurt you in anyway? I was literally --"

This is Hunter saying: "I was literally apologizing for taking so long to give you \$10,000." That's Hunter's words.

And I think what -- you know, and the reason why I'm bringing this story up is because this is the second time that Hunter has ever responded to a writer. And he responded to the writer, Andrew Kerr, at the *Washington Examiner*, by -- by saying

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1	four words: "What's wrong with you?"22
2	Think about a writer asking you for comment,
3	when you're constructing an alibi with a Russian
4	hooker, and you respond to him with, "What's wrong
5	with you?" I mean did did over four years
6	with you?" I mean did did over four years have passed, most three-and-a-half basically
7	since the since the content of the laptop was
8	done in real life in real time, and Hunter
9	hasn't changed at all. Not one bit. He's still
10	blaming all of his sins on other people. He takes
11	no accountability. Everything is not his fault.
12	He just blames it on his addiction.
13	So I don't have any problem running this guy
14	over the coals because he's shown no remorse. It's
15	all because of the drugs he blames all the bad
16	shit he's done on drugs and he's just a terrible
17	guy.
18	So I felt that was important because some
19	people think, "Oh, don't beat up on him." <sup>23</sup> It's
20	like, "The boy is only 52!" <sup>24</sup>
21	RONE: Yeah.
22	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Right? This isn't Barron
23	Trump, you know. Give me a break.
24	RONE: No. You're a hundred percent right
25	and, you know, in addition to doing all that stuff,

1	ne continues to trasif the people who have been,
2	like, legitimately his only support system
3	throughout the course of his completely messed-up
4	life, and that's his family.
5	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yeah.
6	RONE: We've seen through some of those
7	e-mails and messages he trashes his stepmom, he has
8	zero respect for his father, and and knows that,
9	you know, the only thing Joe Biden's good for is
10	throwing his name around to line his pockets with
11	whatever corrupt business deals he's getting into.
12	And, you know, as as this narrative
13	continues to grow and we paint a more clear picture
14	of it, it's going to be interesting after we see
15	what happens in the midterm elections just how
16	far I mean if you look at the laundry list of
17	people who are in line to get whacked,
18	metaphorically, once the House and Senate flip,
19	you're talking about everyone from Joe Biden,
20	Alejandro Mayorkas, Merrick Garland, you've got
21	Austin and Milley, Dr. Fauci, just to name a few,
22	and then
23	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Uh-huh.
24	RONE: there's this Hunter Biden thing.
25	How much of what he's done in the background

1	over the course of the last decade or more is going
2	to, you know, tie itself into a lot of these things
3	that are happening right now: The removal of the
4	tariffs and taxes on China, and and a lot of
5	the, you know, funds that are going to people in
6	tariffs and taxes on China, and and a lot of the, you know, funds that are going to people in Ukraine, not to fund the war but to, like, you know, help their regular government keep the lights
7	know, help their regular government keep the lights
8	on.
9	It's just, you know
10	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Uh-huh.
11	RONE: really interesting to see where
12	we're going to go with all this.
13	I feel like even though you you've
14	uncovered so much and we've learned so much from
15	this narrative, we we're just scraping the top
16	of what's going to be a pretty big iceberg under
17	the water level right there.
18	Garrett, I did want to talk to you, while
19	we've still got you on. You know, a lot of people
20	on our listenership want to know about some of the
21	times that you've had when you worked inside the
22	Trump administration. Obviously, we're not going

to ask for those presidential privilege like --

type moments, but at the same time, just what the

kind of atmosphere was like, what -- what was it

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3 1	most, you know, heavily scrutinized, but obviously the most America First administration probably in the history of our country; and, you know, based on
4 1	the history of our country; and, you know, based on
5 1	the things you do now, what are some of the things
6 1	hat you saw and experienced that you pulled away
7 1	from that that's kind of developed into things like
8	Marco Polo right now?
9	GARRETT ZIEGLER: That's a very good question.
10	I think that my experience was a lot different
11	than pretty much every other staffer's in this
12 i	n the in the sense that I worked for Peter
13 I	Navarro who is one of three people who have stayed
14	with the president by his side from the 2016
15	campaign all the way to the present.
16	RONE: Yep.
17	GARRETT ZIEGLER: You'll note that he was one
18	of two people, along with Steve Bannon, to get
19 i	ndicted for contempt of Congress. They're after
20 I	nim like, you know, stink on shit.
21	RONE: Yeah.
22	GARRETT ZIEGLER: And the reason is is that
23 I	Peter is so instrumental to the Trump economic
24	vision.
25	And so you ask what it was like. I think it

was -- it was a pleasure working for Peter knowing that we were trying to implement the President's economic vision. It was a total shit show with regard to personnel, I must say. The personnel inside the White House was awful. I have basically a list of who should go where should we return to power. And a lot of our time, honestly, Rone, was arguing with other staffers -
RONE: Yep.

GARRETT ZIEGLER: -- about what course of action. You know, the -- the ingratiation and the infiltration of the RNC and the establishment was so thorough that a lot of times we just were fighting, say, Steven Mnuchin of the Treasury Department.

And, so, it was an amazing experience -- I'm grateful for it. The thing we focused on most was exactly what you just said before your question which was the -- the Chinese question [is one] of the most important -- a top three most important issue, geopolitically is the -- the relationship between America and the -- and the ChiComs.

And if we don't get that figured out -- and that's why I'm -- that's why, in part, why I'm doing Marco Polo, to -- to sort of lead into your -- the last clause of your question, which is

1	the the Chinese are behind this. That's why we
2	named it Marco Polo. It wasn't just because we
3	thought it was cute. It was this Venetian explorer
4	[who] explored the Orient in the [13th] century and
5	we think and it all and he knew that a lot of it
6	led back to China then
7	RONE: Yeah.
8	GARRETT ZIEGLER: with the Silk Road, with
9	everything else.
10	And this is our new Silk Road. The Chinese
11	are behind the Bidens' foreign influence and behind
12	their compromise, and they're pulling the strings
13	now.
14	And so the the Trump administration, to me,
15	when I look back on a Term I and I do think
16	he'll be the second president in American history
17	to serve nonconcurrent terms,
18	NOAH: Agreed.
19	GARRETT ZIEGLER: like Grover Cleveland
20	when I look back at it I I see [Donald Trump to be] the only
21	person to be awake to the Chinese problem. And for that,
22	I'm extremely proud. There were unforced errors
23	with regard to personnel. But, remember: he had so
24	much going against him. He's the first person to
25	ever break the party cartel in American history and

he had to fight a total hoax for so many years. 1 2 And so, you know, he knows about our work at 3 Marco Polo. One of my former colleagues is with him a lot and -- and she says that he -- he's asked 4 5 for -- for our work at Marco Polo on Hunter so I'm 6 very honored by that. And, you know, I'm going to be putting out this over 600-page Report next month 8 and I'm -- I'm ecstatic. 9 So I hope I get to talk to you guys again and I hope that, you know, we can discuss in greater 10 11 detail the issues around personnel because I think 12 personnel is the most important thing with -- you 13 know, when constructing a team. And how I can humbly -- and now I'm humbly submitting how I can 14 15 help in that regard. 16 RONE: Yeah, you know, you're right. We've 17 had so many former high-ranking administration 18 officials who still have great relationships with the 45th president. Obviously Kash Patel is a 19 20 reoccurring guest on this show. 21 GARRETT ZIEGLER: Uh-huh. RONE: So --22 GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yes. 23 -- so is Max Miller, Christina Bobb, Paige Willey, Alex Gray, a lot of the people who 25

1	were, you know, closest to him in some of the most
2	critical moments for the administration. Of
3	course
4	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Uh-huh.
5	RONE: you mentioned Dr. Peter Navarro. We
6	RONE: you mentioned Dr. Peter Navarro. We have the most admiration for that guy on this show.  No one has ever taken China to task more than Peter
7	No one has ever taken China to task more than Peter
8	Navarro has in the course of the
9	GARRETT ZIEGLER: That's true.
10	RONE: four years that he worked for the
11	Trump administration, and exposing a lot of the
12	things that you know, I think the CCP buying up
13	all this land, not just in the United States, but
14	places all over the world, that, you know, their
15	governments went bankrupt on COVID and then China
16	comes into this, they, like, scoop all this land
17	says, "Oh, yeah, we'll rebuild your entr
18	infrastructure and if you can't pay it off, you
19	know, we'll just, own your country."
20	And they've done it
21	GARRETT ZIEGLER: (Indiscernible). [TIME
22	STAMP 0:24:51]
23	RONE: for every everywhere from the
24	Third World in Africa all the way up to more
25	modernized countries, like Italy.

1	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Uh-huh.
2	RONE: And we're really starting to see, you
3	know, a lot more of the geopolitics side of it.
4	And, you know, Dr. Navarro is one of the
5	strongest people. He he's been on our show we
6	love talking to him. He's actually his new book
7	is getting ready to come out in September so he's
8	going to be joining us at some point in August. We
9	just talked to his manager recently and yeah
10	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Wonderful.
11	RONE: yeah. It's like you said, you know,
12	working behind the scenes and moving forward after
13	these midterm elections, it's looking like
14	President Trump's getting ready to announce pretty
15	soon, and when he does
16	GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yes.
17	RONE: I hope that they get an early start
18	off on that staffing because I think that's one of
19	the biggest things that crippled him from the
20	inside out. You know, for all the work that he was
21	able to get done, you know, he he really
22	would've been able to do so much more if he didn't
23	have the administrative state stacked up against
24	him; everything from White House legal [counsel], all the

way up through, you know, the unappointed --

1	GARRETT ZIEGLER: True.
2	RONE: career officials that work
3	throughout all of our federal agencies. And
4	there's 600 of them, for all the people that are
5	listening. So
6	listening. So  GARRETT ZIEGLER: Yes.
7	And you make you make a great point. And
8	we're not saying anything the President hasn't
9	already said publicly. He knows that there are
10	so Judases abound, and we saw it two of Mark
11	Meadows's aides have just Cassidy Hutchinson and
12	Alyssa Farah, I mean, they're miserable hags; and
13	we're dealing with the fallout from those bad
14	staffing choices from Meadows to to this day.
15	So, you know, Peter was a dream in regards to
16	a first boss, and, you know, I'm just chugging away
17	and writing every day and I think you guys will be
18	pleased with what we put out.
19	I appreciate having me on.
20	RONE: No, we certainly do. And most
21	importantly, before we cut with you today, Garrett,
22	is we want to direct as much of our listenership to

follow you, either on social medias and then, of

course, the websites you want to give out. We'll
